We are blessed to have come out of the pandemic in a very strong position. Sadly, not every community of faith in our region can say this.



We are also building a "Treasure Album" which will be kept on a table underneath the Wall. The album is intended to hold a record of bios/photos/memories, of the friends of the Waterton UC. (The pages in the album will be in alphabetical order, though the wall cannot be). We look forward to building this Album and send thanks to those of you who have already contributed.

Weddings, meetings, occasional workshops, retreats and youth group sleep-overs are all part of the life of the church. Community use is welcome. We are happy to be available year-round. We can't guarantee fair weather outside, but inside, there is sanctuary!

**2023 FEE SCHEDULE:** Weddings, including "rain checks" = \$250; Workshops and Meetings = \$200/day or \$100/ half day; Church Youth Group Sleep-overs = \$100; Study Leave Sleep Overs = \$30/person/night. (Changes may occur).

FINANCIAL HEALTH: We continue to manage to balance our modest budget, thanks to the help of generous supporters and a small Mission Support Grant from the United Church of Canada. Any donations which you have been able to provide have been a vital part of our outreach and service. We were so thankful that our financial report for 2022 did not show any covid diminishment. Your continued generous support, even when you were unable to attend, is the reason for this good news.

NOTE: We have just learned that upgrading the cathedral windows may be needed fairly soon. Researching Green grant funding and working on ways to meet this new challenge has become a priority.

We were honoured to have her carry the sign into the Church. As well, Young Alex Lawson, Indigenous grandson of Rev. Alex, (recently graduated from the Social Work program at U Vic), edited the wording. May we all continue learning to be allies.

April 30<sup>th</sup> 2022, marked the third anniversary of the passing of our Minister Emeritus, Rev. Dr. Alex Lawson. Friends and family shared many memories. As minister,



counsellor, and friend, he has touched countless friends in lifeaffirming ways. He had an unlimited definition of family.

From his recorded sermons, his daughter Sheena chose these quotes for the newsletter. "As I live in love, I live in Him. After all, the only religious activity for the Christian, the only true worship, is to love God, and our neighbours, as ourselves. And if I do that, so shall my walk be closer to God. 'Calm and serene my frame, so pure light shall mark my road, that leads me to the

Lamb'. And Benediction: "Go now. Go walking in the footsteps of the Master, reaching out to all with whom you come in contact. May God Bless You, now and forevermore."

In late June, Mr. Bryan Huston, Retired Licenced Lay Leader and permanent Watertonian, graciously presented a lively service (at the last minute when we had a cancellation). Thank you Bryan!! It is a pleasure to have your on-going support now that Waterton is your permanent address! And Barb, thanks for your wise counsel and help with the poster run!

In early July Rev. Grant Dillenbeck and Mrs. Ruth Richardson returned to lead from Stittsville United Church in Ottawa. In the afternoon they offered "Forest Church", a gentle hike around town with pauses to appreciate the surrounding beauty, and time to talk about feeling close to the Divine in nature and time to just be still.

Rev. Taylor Croissant and his wife, Rev. MiYuon, brought many congregants with them from Southminster, Fort MacLeod and Granum United Churches. Pot luck luncheons have been able to return, and we are thankful!).

Honorary Associate Minister Rev. Eva Stanley and her musician daughter Liz DiMarino led next, a lovely service, and shared some quality time hiking and resting....a good part of what it's all about.

Allison Houston, Music Minister from Stittsville United Church, brought many family members for a service of stellar music, including piano and organ in duet.

On July 31st, Minister Tony Snow, Indigenous Lead for the UCC Chinook Winds Region, led morning and afternoon services. We talked about the tragic discoveries of the unmarked graves of hundreds of children, lost in the Residential School system. We are heart-broken. We have so much work to do. To go forward, before real healing can begin, we need to listen and acknowledge the tragedies and injustices of the past.

In early August, Rev. Nancy Nourse and Brad Lavenne suggested some ways in which we could address the issue of our front "lawn" area, which had become a desert forming the base of a village of Columbian ground squirrels. We are discussing options of possible improvements.


**However, we have an issue that requires more immediate action**. The soffit and fascia underneath the steeple and surrounding the cathedral windows has not received regular upkeep since the building was dedicated in 1961. Estimates and approval from

the UCC have been obtained, and this necessary work will be completed before the summer season. The window frames have been maintained.

The Waterton Lakes Leaseholder Association held their own Memorial afternoon, in honour of loved ones who had passed during covid when gatherings were so restricted. There was candle lighting and sharing about grieving. Mrs. Elizabeth Martin, of Martin's Funeral home in Lethbridge, led the event. We send condolences to all who have suffered losses, and seek ways to network in the future.

When Rev. Darrell Reine and his wife Karen were here, they helped a wedding couple decorate and then restored order afterwards. Darrell was not required to officiate, but certainly went well beyond the extra mile to welcome the wedding party!

In late August, we welcomed back our first post-covid concert! People remembered, 30 folks attended the singular event! Many thanks to Sheena, Randy, Sophie and Neil!! We know you are planning to return!!



Rev. Dr. John Pentland had an unavoidable conflict, and his colleague from the blossoming Hillhurst United Church, Rev. Andria Irwin, was able to take the lead in that space. She was enthusiastic in her observations of Waterton, the church, and the part

of the family whom she met...so much so that she told us she totally re-wrote her sermon on Saturday night. She has booked to come back!

Rev. Marion Martin and an able colleague, both of whom are Diaconal Ministers, led a joint service on the last Sunday in August. The Milk River Choir and many folks from Milk River and Raymond United Churches attended the Celtic-themed service.

Dr. Harper has been very supportive and positive in the months since he has assumed the position of our Supervisor.



# **August 13<sup>th</sup>: Rev. Nancy Nourse,**REFLECTION FROM REV NANCY NOURSE

Coordinating Minister for Northminster and St David's United Churches in Calgary

Jesus told him, "I am the way, the truth, and the life!" ... John 14:6

C. S. Lewis in 1945 wrote "Meditation in a Toolshed." He tells the story of entering a toolshed and coming upon a beam of light shining through the otherwise darkened

room. At first he paid attention to the light and the specks of dust floating in that light (sounds like my house), but then his perspective changed and he focused on what that beam of light was highlighting. Lewis said that his perspective changed and suddenly he was paying attention to the leaves on the branches and the blue sky beyond the door of the toolshed. Instead of looking at the beam, he focused on how the light transformed what he saw through it.

When Jesus says, "I am the way, the truth, and the life," we often hear him say these words with strictness in his voice. But through a different lens and light perhaps this is a more hopeful message. When we are searching, there is relief when we follow the way of Jesus. When we are seeking understanding, Jesus provides an answer. No matter what we are facing, Jesus offers life. Looking to Jesus is, indeed, transformational.

What if we looked along the beam, stepped into it, experienced it? No doubt we would see God's light in a new way and appreciate God's beauty more than we do now. Our perspective on a lot of this would change. If we looked along the beam, it would help us see and love the blue sky beyond the door.

As verse two from "This is God's Wondrous World" says...

This is God's wondrous world: the birds their carols raise; The morning light, the lily white, declare their Maker's praise. This is God's wondrous world: God shines in all that's fair; In the rustling grass or mountain pass, God's voice speaks everywhere.



I can't wait!




