MESSAGE FROM CHAIR PERSON BARBARA CLAY



Hello! to all friends of Waterton United Church. I write on behalf of our Church Council, which works hard to keep our little church open and functioning as "the open doors of Jesus Christ".

It is heartening to hear how much people love coming to our church in the

mountains, how they have their faith uplifted upon seeing Vimy Mountain framed in the cathedral window. We are

grateful beyond words to those who can join us for worship and/or support us in other ways. We are thankful also for the support of the Chinook Winds Region of the United Church of Canada, for their support and advice in all things.

Waterton United Church is unique in many ways, which we celebrate. One way in which we share the experience of many other United Churches is that our building is aging. Opened in 1961, it is sturdy and in excellent shape, thanks to the diligent work of many volunteers, and the steadfast financial and advisory support of the General Council of the United Church.

However, our beautiful cathedral windows, installed with wooden frames, caulking and single pane glass, are a heat loss area in winter, and a heat sink in summer. We have been advised that the caulking will not last much longer, and that measures must be taken to remediate these problems, which could include replacing all of the windows.

The opportunity of using solar energy to alleviate utility costs has also arisen (installation of solar panels). Both of these projects will be a big challenge for our small council, but we have plans, detailed elsewhere in the newsletter. It goes without saying that we will be grateful for any way in which our faith family can provide support.

I am so pleased to be able to be part of the Waterton United Church Council as we move forward guided by our Pastoral Charge Supervisor, Rev. Eva Stanley. We welcome anyone who would like to contribute their time and energy by serving on our Council. We meet about four times per year with Zoom options. With thanks and blessings to all,

Weddings, meetings, occasional workshops, retreats and youth group sleep-overs are all part of the life of the church. Community use is welcome. We are happy to be available year-round. We can't guarantee fair weather outside, but inside, there is sanctuary! 2025 FEE SCHEDULE: Increased this year. Weddings, including "rain checks" = \$300; Workshops and Meetings = \$240/day or \$120/ half day; Church Youth Group Sleep-overs = \$120/day. Study/retreat sleep overs = \$36 /night.

FINANCIAL HEALTH: We continue to manage to balance our modest budget, thanks to the help of generous supporters and a small Mission Support Grant from the United Church of Canada. **Any donations** which you have been able to provide have been a vital part of our outreach and service. We were so thankful that our financial report for 2024 did not show any decrease. Your continued generous support, even when you were unable to attend, is the reason for this good news.

Property improvement

Our beautiful installation of cathedral windows frame Mount Vimy as per the vision of our architect, George Watson in 1961. For 64 years, they have provided beauty, inspiration and joy to anyone who views them upon entering the building.

However, we need, urgently, to identify financial resources to repair or replace these windows, because of their age and condition. Also, we have an opportunity to improve our energy footprint with an installation of solar panels on the south-facing peak of the church roof. A granting opportunity is available to help with these projects through Faithful Footprints, a funding arm of the United Church of Canada.

We have received 3 quotes to remediate/replace the windows, and quotes are being sought for solar panel installations. If we are able to obtain a grant to partially fund

these projects, we still need to pay for them first and will then receive 2/3 of the cost in a grant.

After much thought and deliberation, Council has decided to conduct a campaign to help raise funds for these projects. Our operating and capital budgets, in their entirety, would not fund these, and personal loans are out of the question. A number of initiatives are being discussed. The first is to ask each guest clergy officiating at our summer Sunday services to mention the need, and ask for donations earmarked specifically for this project. Other ideas are being developed by Church Council and will be publicized widely when finalized.

HIGHLIGHTS OF 2024–EARLY 2025

Youth Groups: We have had two groups come and stay (for a night or two) this past winter.

Our Little Free Library has books and comfortable chairs! On the lee side of the church, we have created a place for reading and meditation. It is the handiwork of the late and dearly missed Bob Clay. Please come, sit a spell, take a book If you choose. We have a substantial reserve, thanks to generous donors. The bench in memory of Dr. Ed Bardock enhances the site. Last summer we tried locating the library on the "Valley" side of the church, which definitely increased the comings and goings around it!

We are very pleased that our **special sign honouring the territory** of the **Treaty 7 Indigenous First Nations** is a permanent part of our sanctuary. In 2019, Angelene



McIntyre, a former Park Employee of Git'sa'an heritage (Hazelton, B.C. area) and a former Sunday School Teacher here, happened to be visiting when the sign was ready. We were honoured to have her carry the sign into the Church. As well, Young Alex Lawson, Indigenous grandson of Rev. Alex, graduate of the Social Work program at U Vic), edited the wording. May we all continue learning to be allies.

April 30th 2024, marked the fifth anniversary of the passing of our Minister Emeritus, Rev. Dr. Alex Lawson. Since 1990, As minister,


counsellor,

and friend, he has touched countless people in life-and faith-affirming ways. He had an unlimited definition of family.

This plaque in his memory is now a permanent feature of the sanctuary.

From his recorded sermons, his daughter Sheena chose these quotes for the newsletter. "As I live in love, I live in Him. all, the only religious activity for the Christian, the only true worship, is to love and our neighbours, as ourselves. And if I that, so shall my walk be closer to God. 'Calm and serene my frame, so pure Light mark my road, and lead me to the Lamb."

June 16th: Rev. Tony Snow, Indigenous Lead Minister for Chinook Region of the UCC, led a service and discussion towards Truth and Reconciliation. Tony has taught us how the original Christian missionaries to their area learned the language, emphasized education, and offered genuine respect for the culture and ways of the people. Thus, the unconditional love of Jesus flourished in harmony with Stoney tradition. The Stoney-Nakoda word for the Waterton area translates as *the place of the people*.

June 23rd: Rev. Eva Stanley, graciously leading due to a cancellation, gave us a Celtic-themed service, quoting from the traditionally spiritual Scottish Island community of Iona.

June 30 th: Rev. Marion Martin from St. Thomas United Church in Calgary was joined by The Milk River Choir which provided accompaniment for her lively service.

July 7th: Rev. Kim Holmes Younger of Parkdale United spoke of her passion for building church and community and of how Parkdale United has gone from surviving to thriving in the last few years.

July 14th: Rev. Dr. Stephen Harper, Supervising Minister, from Springbank United Church, addressed the need for rest: how even the most enjoyable things in life can be exhausting. In our Creation story, God took a rest on the 7th day, and we have the model of a pause as an essential part of the rhythm of our week.

July 21st: Rev. Eva Stanley, presented a cowboy/ranchland-themed service, a natural fit for Eva, with her prairie roots and years of teaching and then ministering in southern Alberta. Musicians Liz diMarino and
