

MESSAGE FROM PASTORAL CHARGE SUPERVISOR Dr. Ed Bardock, Lethbridge

Moving forward with the Waterton United Church, I am reminded of the passage from Ecclesiastes "To everything there is a season, and a time for every purpose under heaven: a time to be born....." Yes, there is a time and season for each purpose—good news for those of us on the Church Board who often feel like we are always running short on time and there are so many things to do in making the church more inviting.

The author of Ecclesiastes helps us all to keep the events of the past several Years of renovations in perspective, remembering that there were good times and challenging

times and that our faith was with us and our congregational helpers through them all.

We enter 2019 with major renovations and repairs completed. What I find impressive in all of the work done for the church, both in its upkeep and contributions to the yearly services and activities, is the spirit of cooperation that exists among and between all who assist in these undertakings. As St. Francis of Assisi once said "*Remember when you leave this earth, you can take nothing you have received…only what you have given, a full heart, enriched by honest service, love, honour and courage.*" By holding to Christ's principle of love, they demonstrate compassion for others and for the church; in upholding honor, they show respect for all who worship in a beautiful little Park church; and in courage, they give of themselves and their talents to build on what they so clearly value. It is the cry of a baby and it is the cry of God...the cry of every mother who has buried a child...the cry of the worker whose family suffers because of another layoff...the cry of a husband or wife whose arms are empty after years of companionship...the cry of a body in the throes of cancer or heart disease...the cry of every human heart that has suffered. In December, when the sun is at its lowest, we may feel encumbered that we are losers of the light. But, we also know that in the revival of Spring, with all of earth's beauty coming forth, we have the assurance that we can behold the glory of God's creation and the truth of the words in our Creed...we truly are not alone. 

LOSING OUR MINISTER EMERITUS, REV. DR. ALEX LAWSON: He was 93, vigorously writing his weekly "blethers" and still a healthy, active leader, when he suddenly became very ill on April 27th, and passed on the 30th. We feel bereft, but his incredible legacy will always inspire us. The number of people whom he has guided to healing and wholeness truly cannot be counted. We send our profound condolences to his family, and his many, many friends.

His obituary can be seen on the web-page of Martin Bros. in Lethbridge. A memorial in his home church in Victoria will occur on May 11^{th} . On June 8^{th} , at 2 p.m., Martin Bros. will host his Lethbridge Memorial. On September 8^{th} , in the Waterton United Church, we envision a special service with Rev. Frank Lewis, in honour of Alex, to celebrate his life and legacy, his priceless gift of unconditional love to so very many, to the United Church and to the Waterton community.

In April, Alex wrote:

Jesus was a radical, and nowhere was he more radical than in his portrayal of God. Until the coming of Jesus God was perceived as one who rewarded and punished his people depending on how they obeyed or disobeyed his laws. The good were rewarded with children, livestock, health, success and wealth, while the disobedient were cursed with the drowning of whole armies, the death of the first born of their families, famine, disease, and the drowning of multitudes. The people learned to adapt to the will of an allpowerful God. And in that pre-newtonian world, God controlled all of the natural elements. Along came Jesus and his disciples who taught that God was a God of love who loved us unconditionally. It was radical teaching and it launched the Christian Church with the profound message that God was a God of love. But the church wasn't ready for such a radical message. It held on to beliefs like hell, eternal punishment, the devil, and original sin and said that there was no salvation outside the Church. Salvation had to be earned. Parents also maintained the Rewards and Punishment method of childrearing in which they had been brought up. A recent poll of Canadians showed that the majority want to be able to spank their children. A consequence of this is that children will strive for conformity and obedience which, as Virginia Satir says, " is a fertile soil

for developing decisions and conclusions about oneself that are often detrimental". The Church needs to follow its declarations about the nature of God by teaching parents to parent their children in the image of God. God created a world of understandable laws which He does not break. It is a world of consequences, not of punishment and reward, and all family discipline must be likewise. As a Church we ought to teach our parents how to discipline by allowing consequences to have their effect. Thus, we will produce fully functional human beings who reflect the image of God.

Note. I introduced this form of parenting at Minto U.C. in Moose Jaw, in 1973 and followed it at McKillop. Thousands have attended. Dr. Alex Lawson, April 15th.

2019: MESSAGES FROM OUR SUMMER GUEST CLERGY

MAY 19^{th,} 10:30 a.m (Opening week-end!) REV. PAULINE BELL, Lethbridge.



We read in Luke 24: 13, that two disciples, Cleopas and his friend, put their feet on the road to Emmaus. They just needed to walk and talk, to assimilate their understandings of what had happened to Jesus and themselves. They are bewildered, confused, hurt. They know not what to do.

When life threatens to overwhelm, sometimes one just needs to go for a walk. Whether literally or figuratively, one must reflect. From our moments of reflection come the

glimmers from the pathway of next steps.

The Emmaus journey, the time of turning away from chaos, the search for next-step ideas, is very much the journey of all who love and support both Waterton United Church, and the ministry which it offers.

When the traumatizing Kenow fire (September of '17) swept over the Divide and rushed down the Akamina and Blakiston valleys, the townsite and other key areas survived due to an incredible defence force organized by Parks Canada. When the smoke cleared away, we could see that we needed to remove the very dry old cedar on the steeple and the exterior walls of the church and install new steeple shingles and siding. This was accomplished last summer, thanks to Ed Bardock and the co-ordinated work by the Council and excellent tradesmen.

When Rev. Dr. Alex Lawson retired to Victoria, we knew that his love of Waterton and its people would be felt from afar rather than in person. Recently, we learned that we had to say good-bye to our good and faithful servant. We grieve, and send condolences to his family.

These alterations in the fabric of our life at Waterton United have very much directed us into our own Emmaus journey. We, like the disciples, need to put down our sadness and unease. We need to go for a walk. We must walk forward ... toward that which sits before us awaiting our awareness and recognition.

As we look forward, of course, we will see the face of Christ. That is our gift. The Unending Love, our Creator God, is our legacy, our companion, our destiny. This Easter promise is our past, our present, and our future. Our connections, our relationships, will continue to be found along our pathways of ministry together. The future of Waterton UC will hold all that the Spirit can create through and with us. We are blessed! -- Rev. Pauline Bell, our Co-Supervisor.

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JUNE 30th: MRS. MARIE BARR, Retired LPM, now from Lloydminster (Lay Pastoral Minister.)

Held in Grace, touched to follow

Ten years ago marked a giant step in my road to ministry as I was recognized as a Lay Pastoral Minister within the United Church. At 19, I chose to look after my grandmother rather than answering God's call to paid-accountable ministry. At 37, I chose to remain as the editor/publisher of the two newspapers in Cardston and Raymond, rather than answering my call. But God does not ever give up on anyone so, at 55, I entered discernment and we decided Lay Pastoral Ministry was where I needed to be in this great church of ours. At 72, I am right where I want to be – retired and serving God in Lloydminster, AB.

Just prior to entering my three-year journey to being recognized on May 26, I worked downtown at The Evergreen on Main Street, Waterton. Answering God's call was very easy as I worked in this awe-filled park. Looking out the window daily at the lake and driving from Cardston into the park, I could not help being pushed in the direction I have always felt called. I have, for all my life, been held in grace and touched to follow – from a member and leader of Explorers and CGIT, to a Sunday School teacher, superintendent, curriculum consultant and lay worship leader – I have always been in ministry. Until entering this stream of ministry, however, it was never enough.

I had a stroke on February 19, 2019. It was a great wake up call, I can tell you I really found it eye opening! I have said I will use June 30 to see if I can do this again. I think I can to the same level but I must let you be the judges! I have the smarts and I have the voice, so I will try to show those who doubt me that I can do it again. It will be up to God! I will try my best to deliver what I did before. I think I can, so I will.

I am scared but I have been scared before and I was still able to function so I will again.

No matter what your call is - to motherhood, to store clerk, to account executive, to car mechanic - remember that God never gives up on any of us - not me, and certainly not you. I am looking forward to spending a week this summer renewing my soul among the people who live in and visit this wonder of God's creation. Please join us Saturday

night as well as Sunday mornings as we explore this wonderful journey God has placed before us.

It's also two weeks after Easter, and our lectionary readings still have Jesus reappearing to his disciples after the resurrection. By its title, Endgame sounds like it's the end. At least Marvel wants you to think that for now. But is it?

And so it is with story from John 21... it feels like the end – the end of the three years of ministry the disciples shared with Jesus. The end of Jesus' life and teachings. And his death. It's Endgame time – at least that's what the disciples thought.

Instead of it being the Endgame, there is so much more to come!

In John, Peter goes back to old habits; he plans a late-night fishing trip with some of the other disciples. It was a distraction from everything else going on. But they didn't catch one fish all night...another failure...just like that Friday night after Jesus' death. More goals unachieved. And they are wondering what's next. They are still trying to make sense of everything.

After Jesus appears to the disciples and tells them to fish with their net on the other side of the boat, they catch so many fish they worry their nets will

break. Later, they gather for a campfire breakfast on the beach. And Jesus and Peter have a conversation. Jesus offers Peter two important things: belonging and purpose. How important these two things are...we all need to feel accepted by a larger group in order to have stability and a sense of self. And we all need a sense of




purpose...the belief that what we do matters. It's one of the greatest motivators in the world.

Jesus gives Peter good work to do: feed my sheep! Lead! Devote yourself to this community! This story is just one of hundreds in Scripture that do the same thing by granting us all a sense of belonging and purpose.

At the end of John 21, you'll find the very last verse of the whole gospel: "But there are also many other things that Jesus did; if every one of them were written down, I suppose that the world itself could not contain the books that would be written."

Because, indeed, this story is not yet finished. It is not the Endgame. There are so many other things that Jesus did that John couldn't imagine writing them all. And there are so many things Jesus is still doing through us that the tale of them would fill all the books of the world!

Jesus reminds us that we belong. And we have purpose. We thank God for that! Amen.



AUGUST 19th: PASTOR DR. GEORGE TAKASHIMA,: with Japanese – First United – St. Andrew's Cardston, Combined Choir. Pastor George is retired in Lethbridge, most recently from Cardston-Magrath Pastoral Charge.

"Once Jesus was asked by the Pharisees when the Kingdom of God was coming, and He answered, 'The Kingdom of God is not coming with things that can be observed'. (Luke 17:20).

We, as the Body of Christ, need to continue saying and listening to Jesus' prayer for unity. The church, obviously,

Remains divided in many ways and places. We are divided today over issues" homosexuality, abortion, the death penalty, et al. We square off over matters of liturgy and style. Building programs can become ugly power struggles, and the fighting is not always fair. Individuals leave churches in a huff over matters as trivial as the colour of carpeting or the length of candles. Whole denominations split acrimoniously over issues of Biblical interpretation.

The seeming assumption of the Church in such matters of doctrine, social obligation and liturgy, that we will then achieve the unity Jesus prays for. The idea is that once we "get it right", we will then be one in Christ. So this group squares off against that group in a game of eccliastical capture-the-flag. The focus and politics of the church are then lived out in terms of a mad scramble to get to the top of the hill, upon which "I am right and you are wrong." All of which puts the cart before the horse.

The truth is that we can share oneness only as we surrender our lives to Christ, at the bottom of the hill, from where we look up to Him. Such collective surrender, based on our shared belief that is impossible tolook down on anyone when together we look up to Christ, unified by our brokenness as people and our belief that He is God. In the context of such shared belief, different styles of worship are no more important than different colours of hair. When unified by shared surrender to Christ's lordship, members of different congregations are no longer suspicious or total enemies; they are more like different vegetables sharing the same bowl – each bringing different flavours and nutrients to a hungry world.

AUGUST 27th, REV. MARION MARTIN, Diaconal Minister, Milk River and Raymond, United Churches, with the Milk River Choir.



I have lived in southern Alberta for 22 years, and it was shortly after moving here that I visited Waterton National Park for the first time. A NOTE ABOUT THE UNITED CHURCH CREST: In 2012, the United Church Crest, which has contained symbols for each of the founding denominations of the United Church of Canada since 1925, was **up-dated in a tribute to aboriginal Canadians**. The traditional colours of the aboriginal medicine wheel, yellow, black, red and white, were incorporated, as were the Mohawk words for "All my relations:" *Akwe nia' tetewa : neren*. Aboriginal members of the U.C. General Council chose the Mohawk phrase as representative of them all. A long, spontaneous, standing ovation followed the passing of the motion.

More recently, **Blanket Exercises**, developed by the Ecumenical Organization, **Kairos**, have become increasingly popular across the country. They are primarily designed as educational for non First-Nations people, and are always led by a First Nations Elder. Two of the Waterton Council members were privileged to have been able to attend a Blanket Exercisein 2017, sponsored by Kainai (Blood Tribe) Elders and the Mennonite Central Committee of Alberta. With prayers for peace and

forgiveness, **honouring the ancestors of everyone there**, the exercise fostered a much deeper level of understanding that will never be forgotten. May we continue to go forward from Truth and Reconciliation in real, concrete ways, walking together with faith and compassion.

The United Church of Canada has re-organized its structure. Regional Councils now replace Conferences and Presbyteries all across the country. The south half of Alberta (from Hwy 13 south to the International border is has a new name: **Chinook Winds Region 3.** Our central office is in Okotoks. We have already experienced kind and perceptive outreach from our Regional Council, even in the mids of such a major transition. We look forward to the future as the United Church of Canada moves faithfully and prayerfully into this new structure.

Building and Maintaining Mission and Service Programs:

SBNR: The Spiritual but Not Religious: Have you heard of these folks? More and more people identify in this way. The advice of one Observer writer is to: engage with them and welcome them into community, expressing the love of Jesus Christ, and listening.


